



Orkin General Information on Methods of Control

Non-Chemical Techniques

Orkin will install sticky traps to trap crawling insects and rodents for the dual purpose of monitoring as well as for limited control. Glue traps will be placed in areas most likely to be frequented by pests, yet will be placed in locations that will not interfere with operations.

Mechanical traps may be installed as the need dictates to monitor for and to control mice in exterior and interior locations. Traps will be installed in areas most likely to be frequented by mice such as near exterior doors, in food service locations or along walls in storage areas that might serve as rodent runways.

Ultra-Violet (UV) light traps are recommended to be installed at building entrances, food service areas, or in other locations where flying insects might be a constant nuisance. Units are available from Orkin on a purchase/service program or on a lease/service program.

Caulk, cement mortar, or foam sealants are recommended to be used to close openings that can be used by pests either as entry points or as harborage.

Chemical Techniques

Insect bait formulations will be the primary formulation used indoors where the odor of pesticides is not acceptable, yet the threat of insects is prevalent. Insect baits offer long-term control alternative to residual insecticide sprays

Residual insecticides will be restricted in their use within those areas to control and to prevent insect infestations. Examples include treating outside foundation walls with liquid insecticides; the use of dry powder insecticides inside wall voids in food service areas; or the use of granular insecticides on soil adjacent to the building exterior.

Rodent bait formulations may be used in outdoor locations to control active infestations of rodents, or may be installed as a preventative measure targeting migrating rodents from neighboring properties. When used, rodent baits will be placed within tamper resistant enclosed bait stations that are clearly labeled. The stations will be anchored to the substrate or chained to an upright support such as a fence or utility pole.

Materials

The materials used by Orkin for pest control treatment work shall conform to Federal, State and Local ordinances and laws. Rodenticides shall be used with all due precaution to obviate the possibility of accident or injury to humans, domestic animals and pets. Special care shall be exercised in the use of liquid insecticides in areas having asphalt, mastic, or linoleum floor surfaces. All pest control work shall be performed in a safe, professional manner, in accordance with the most modern and effective pest control techniques and procedures. The Orkin provided chemical preparations, which are considered hazardous or potentially hazardous to the health of humans and domestic animals, groundwater contamination, etc., will provide to the site all appropriate and current SDS (safety data sheets). Copies of labels and Material Safety Data Sheets will be located in the Logbook.



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Prior to beginning service for your facility under this service contract, the Orkin Service Branch will submit for review, specimen labels and the most current manufacturer's MSDS sheet(s) for all chemicals that are planned for use at Uchee Creek facilities. All pesticides will be used in accordance with the manufacturer's label directions and shall be in compliance with Federal, State and Local regulations.

Target Areas & General Covered Pests:

Target Areas are defined as those areas in or around a building where pests are most prevalent and are known to frequent in large numbers. Target areas shall receive primary, concentrated emphasis and treatment from the Orkin Service Technician. Each location will have several target areas, both inside and outside the buildings. For example the kitchens, garbage collection areas, dining areas, food storage areas, bath areas, etc. During the site visits, Orkin and the Facility Manager or designate will identify, designate and agree on specific target areas.

Service Reports

Your Orkin Service Technician will provide a written report after each service, which will describe deficiencies in housekeeping, maintenance, or sanitation, which could induce pest problems and will include:

- A checklist indicating the areas treated;
- A list of chemicals used in each area treated;
- A delivery receipt (ticket)* signed by the Orkin service technician and the Facility Manager or designate; and
- Obtain the signature of the Facility Manager or designate verifying that service has been rendered;

The delivery receipt (ticket) will reflect the address, telephone number, and name of the Orkin Service Branch. However, if problems arise, the facility manager or designate should contact the Orkin Service Branch.

The facility will be responsible for prompt correction of the deficiencies noted on the written report provided by your Orkin Service Technician. This is critical to insure the integrity of your IPM program. Orkin would request the Facility Manager to contact for approval of Ancillary Services and any other services requiring special treatments.

CONSUMER NOTIFICATION(S) / POST APPLICATION STATEMENTS

Treated Area(s) - Do not allow unprotected person(s), children, or pets to touch, enter or replace items or bedding, to contact or enter treated area(s) until dry.

Ventilation/Reoccupying – Vacate and keep area(s) closed up to 30 minutes after treatment, then ventilate area(s) well for up to 2 hours before reoccupying.

Equipment/Processing/Food – Thoroughly wash dishes, utensils, food preparation/processing equipment and surfaces with an effective cleaning compound and rinse with clean water if not removed or covered during treatment. This area should be odor free before food products are placed in the area.

Exterior Applications (baits) – Do not allow grazing of feed, lawn or sod clippings to livestock after bait applications.

Granular Application(s) – Do not water to the point of run off.

Do not burn treated fire wood for one month after treatment.

Tips, Techniques and News on Maintaining Safety in Orkin Branches

Personal Protective Equipment

Safety remains the number one priority at Orkin. Pesticides are hazardous so it's important to protect yourself when mixing or applying them. Wearing your personal protective equipment is one of the best protective defenses against on-the-job hazards.

It's important to make sure you have all of the required safety equipment. Do you have?

Dust Mask	Goggles
Bump Cap	Gloves
Respirator	Anti-slip shoes
Knee pads	Crawl suit

If you do not have these items, or if they are in poor condition, talk to your manager to get what you need. Your safety is up to you! Let's review these important pieces of equipment and what they are used for.



DUST MASK

Be sure to wear a dust mask to protect your lungs in dusty areas like attics or crawl spaces. A dust mask will block fumes and particles from the air you breathe.



GOGGLES

Do you use a drill or another tool that causes material to go airborne? Are you putting yourself in danger of becoming a statistic?

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) reports that thousands of people are blinded every year because they do not use eye protection... not because they didn't have it, but because they chose not to use it. These injuries can be easily prevented by just putting on your goggles.

BUMP CAP



Have you crawled around an attic or crawl space this week? How about worked outside around windows or overhangs? Were you inspecting a basement with unstable storage items or low ceilings/clearance?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, did you wear a bump cap to protect your head?

Make sure that your bump cap is in mint condition. Check it for signs of damage or wear. Make sure the cap has no dents or cracks.

Store your bump cap away from excessive heat and sunlight, and avoid getting chemicals on it because they can actually weaken the cap.



GLOVES

Using our hands is so common that we don't even think about it. Not properly caring for your hands when working with chemicals or in unsanitary areas can have damaging effects. We must take extra care and pay close attention to hand safety.

Orkin provides both lined and unlined gloves to protect your hands, fingers, wrists and forearms. When mixing or applying chemicals, be sure to wear unlined gloves, because they are chemical-resistant.



RESPIRATOR

Respirators protect against harmful dusts, gases, and sprays. When the mask is worn, the attached cartridges remove contaminants from the air you breathe. It is up to you to make sure that your respirator fits properly. Your air-purifying respirator should fit tightly on your face.

You are also expected to maintain your respirator by cleaning, inspecting, and sanitizing it before and after each use. This will keep your respirator in good working condition. Respirators should be stored in a sealed plastic bag.

According to OSHA, almost 5 million workers are required to wear a respirator throughout the United States. Respirators are required by both OSHA and Orkin for your protection. Compliance with wearing a respirator could save you from illness and possibly even death.



ANTI-SLIP SHOES

According to OSHA, slips, trips, and falls cause 15 percent of all accidental deaths. Fall accidental deaths are second only to motor vehicles. It's important to wear anti-slip shoes in situations where you may encounter wet or slippery conditions, or when you might have to climb a ladder. These shoes have soles with enhanced grip for situations where slipping hazards may be present.



KNEE & ELBOW PADS

Do your knees ache? When working in a crawl space, your knees typically begin to ache first. Knee pads are supplied for comfort and to prevent you from injuring your knees on broken glass, rocks, nails, or any other debris found in crawl spaces.



CRAWL SUIT

Clothing is considered to be a type of PPE because it keeps pesticides from coming into contact with your skin.

Wearing a crawl suit over your clothing provides additional protection by separating you from any hazardous materials. Don't forget, it can be easily removed if contaminated.

As always, read the label and MSDS for guidelines on using PPE... and follow them!
